The Upland Baptist Food Bank has been in operation for more than 40 years. We continue to provide food assistance for families and individuals in our community. Currently, we are serving approximately 40 families each week and in addition, every other week we deliver to 34 housebound Senior Citizens.

We stock our shelves through a State grant, local church support and individual donations. All of the money received by the Upland Baptist Food Bank goes directly to purchasing food that is given to our clients. We have found that buying in bulk is better stewardship. We work to provide the basics for our clients, though currently our donations are down and our number of clients is growing. All of our workers are volunteers from the church and the community.

In the past year we have worked to diversify the types of food available to our clients. We now have access to multiple freezers, which allows us to purchase frozen meat. We also have been providing recipes that use the food we distribute.

We try to use to everything we are given or purchase. Recently, we realized that we have an excess of black beans on our shelves. We found a recipe that used the beans, one of our volunteers made a sample. During our hours of operation, we gave clients the opportunity to taste the dish, receive a recipe and the ingredients to make the dish at home. We want to expand our ability to provide healthy meal options with ingredients and recipes.

In order to accomplish this goal, we would like to purchase fresh fruits and vegetables each week. We have made arrangements with our local Produce Junction to purchase fruits and vegetables in bulk. By providing fresh food alternatives and recipes suggestions for how to use them, we are hoping to encourage healthy eating in our clients.

Fresh produce is often difficult for our clients to obtain. We recognize that the cost of fresh produce is often prohibitive for our clients. We also realize that when taking public transportation, purchasing fresh fruits and vegetables can be difficult. By providing a rotating variety of fresh foods, we hope to increase our clients' reliance on them and help them realize the value of adding them to their diets.
