### 3. How do you plan to use the requested funds? How will the funds specifically assist individuals battling poverty and its effects?

Through our after school and summer youth enrichment programs, we serve more than 125 neighborhood students from low-income families annually. Our 42-week long after school and summer programs help students from grades 1-9 with their homework, reading, social skills, recreation, self-esteem, leadership development, and to set goals and achieve them. We conduct vacation bible school every summer for our neighborhood students. The schools where our students come from registered more than 94 % of their students as enjoying free or reduced lunch. Knowing the level of poverty and the scarcity of food in our community, we serve dinner (full meal) during our after school program and lunch during our summer program with the help of Harvesters: the Community Food Network based in Kansas City, MO.

The requested funds will be used to buy school supplies and backpacks, gas/fuel for our vans that pick up and drop off our students from home/school to Bethel Center and back to their homes, healthy snacks, age appropriate books, educational field trips, and game materials for our students. We will also use the money to invite motivational speakers to speak to our students. If we have any money left, we will use them to buy food for our food pantry.

We believe that education is one of the most important tools to break the cycle of poverty. Having all the required school supplies and backpacks will motivate our students not only to go school but to learn. We have seen and helped some of our refugee students who had no school supplies as their parents didn't know what all were necessary to go to school. A Burmese student we once helped said, "Having school supplies and a backpack makes me feel equal with the rest of my friends and having them make me feel good."

Many of the families and students we serve at our Center are living in poverty mostly due to the lack of education. The parents do not have the skills they need to get good jobs, and their children will continue to live in poverty unless they are educated and equipped with the right knowledge and skills.

Many of the students we work with never went to parks, educational fieldtrips, or recreation centers with their parents as their parents could not afford to take them. After a donor made it possible for our students to visit a Science City, our students want to know more about science and they become more inquisitive. The fieldtrips we took/take are helping them to increase their knowledge as they help them to know more than their immediate environment. Knowing what is out there and what people do, we believe, is helpful for them instead of accepting life as it comes.

As many of the parents do not speak English, they cannot help their children with their homework. They are very pleased seeing their children motivated to go to school with their homework done, reading and speaking English better, improving their grades, and able to interpret for them. Bethel Neighborhood Center plays a very important role in the growth and development of the students who came/come to our Center.

Since we serve our community as the hands and feet of Jesus Christ, the activities we do at our Center help the overall development of our neighborhood students in particular and the residents in general.
