## **Board of General Ministries Reports: ABCUSA/OGS and Associated Ministry Organizations**

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**Rainbow Acres**

Rainbow Acres continues to serve adults with developmental disabilities from our campus in central Arizona, as we have for over fifty years. By the time you read this, we will have completed our 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebration with our annual Family and Friends Weekend in late October.

At the end of May, the board of our affiliate in Sedona voted to shut down operations in an orderly manner. Unfortunately, their operating model was not sustainable, though they were able to help a few young adults with autism develop their independent living skills. Rainbow Acres was asked to oversee the shutdown, ensuring all legal requirements were met.

In early July, our Board of Trustees asked me to serve as Acting President and CEO. It's been quite the adventure since then, as I juggle my previous roles along with new ones (including fundraising). One of our biggest staffing needs is in fundraising, and we've hired ThinkingAhead to help us in our search for a new Director of Advancement. If you know someone who is passionate about fundraising and would love to live near Sedona, let us know!

We're grateful for the support we continue to receive from American Baptist partners. ABHMS provided us with a grant for our life enrichment academy program. We've welcomed work groups from American Baptist congregations in Grand Junction, CO; Scottsburg, IN; Petersburg, IN; San Francisco, CA; Hanford, CA; Redlands, CA; and West Hartford, CT. We're able to serve mission groups of varying sizes, abilities, and ages. Ask Matt Toupin or Bruce Van Der Beek about their experiences here!

With such support, it was with great joy that we were able to serve our ABC family by participating in a seminar by ABHMS' Center for Continuous Learning. Jen Murphree, our Director of Admissions, presented a webinar on "Faith Formation and Neurodiversity." It's available for replay at the CCL website.

We're excited about our solar electric project. Over a decade of preparation has led to us finally having solar panels on many of our buildings, and we await our electric utility's inspection and approval to start making electricity (and saving money!) It's a large installation, about 10-15 times what a typical church would need, so the engineering and financing were a bit complex. We also had to wait for the right incentives to be in place. We would be happy to share our experiences and show how other ABC organizations and churches can use solar power to save money and help their mission dollars go further. We look forward to a call for proposals for workshops for the next Biennial Mission Summit.

Executive Report to the Board of General Ministries, sitting as the American Baptist Historical Society

Archives

### *JACS*

The Japanese American Confinement Sites (JACS) project has been the primary focus this year, with Project Archivist Brice Bongiovanni and Digital Collections Specialist Jenny Manasco doing most of the work for the project. The project includes digitizing materials from collections held by ABHS that relate to the experience of Japanese Americans interned during WWII and the work of Northern Baptists with them. These materials belong to the archives of the American Baptist Home Mission Society and the Woman's American Baptist Home Mission Society, in manuscript collections, and in the archives of the American Baptist Foreign Mission Society (IM).

In June, Brice and Jenny traveled to Seattle and Los Angeles to scan records for the project. In Seattle, they scanned records held at the University of Washington, including the Emery Andrews Papers and the Betty Fukuyama Papers. Records from Japanese Baptist Church completed the scanning trip to Seattle. In Los Angeles, they spent two days at Atherton Baptist Homes and two days at Gardena Valley Baptist Church scanning church records (Evergreen and GVBC) and collections brought by individuals. These collections included a scrapbook of Roy Ishihara's career as a Baptist Minister. Roy was one of the students that John Thomas' office helped enroll in college and relocate from the internment camp. There was also a scrapbook from a soldier in the 442nd Regimental Combat Team, a collection of hand-carved and painted bird pins, and numerous family letters and documents.

The next phase of the JACS project is designing an online exhibit and a traveling exhibit, which will be on display at the Omaha Biennial. This project will conclude in October 2025.

### *NAGPRA*

The Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA) was passed by Congress in 1990. In December 2023, the Department of the Interior announced final implementation rules that went into effect in January 2024. NAGPRA mandates the repatriation of Native American human remains, funerary objects, sacred objects, or objects of cultural patrimony.

Various collections held by ABHS include items that *may* be considered cultural patrimony, most notably several feathered headdresses. Archivist Mariah Hamby has done detailed research on ABHS-held artifacts in order to compile the summary required by NAGPRA. There will be several further steps to comply with the NAGPRA process.

## *Ancestry.com*

Since 2022 ABHS has been engaged in a collaboration with the genealogy company, Ancestry.com. The first set of records digitized, ABFMS missionary biographical files and sailing cards, are now live on the Ancestry.com website. After the agreed-upon exclusion period of three years, ABHS will be allowed to share the Ancestry-produced digital files on the ABHS website. Digitization continues on the second set of records, Original Church Records.

ABHS has received on deposit the archives from Central Baptist Theological Seminary (CBTS) in Kansas City. This represents a new model of partnership in archives preservation, and the beginning of a new revenue stream as laid out in the Strategic Plan.

## Funding and Fundraising

### *Donations*

Annual Fund donations through September total \$57,239, putting us on track to meet our year-end goal of

\$75,000. \$26,275 were designated as matching funds for the JACS project. Memorial gifts to the endowment total \$775.

### *Grants*

Funding for the Japanese American Confinement Sites project was provided by the National Park Service.

JACS Grant Program, which required raising matching funds at a ratio of 1:2. We received a grant of

\$119,153 from NPS. In 2023, the Finance Committee designated a portion of an estate gift from Roberta Stevens to go toward the JACS grant matching funds. Added to a donation from the Brokaw Gift Fund and ABHMS, we had \$31,885 of the required \$59,577 in hand by the end of 2023. With a grant from the Wilbur Warner Fund of North Shore Baptist Church in Chicago, a gift from the American Baptist Churches of Los Angeles, the Southwest, and Hawai'i, and a few donations from individuals, ABHS matching funds now total \$67,110.

We did not receive funding on a proposal submitted to the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH), "Preparing for Future Accessions by Upgrading and Increasing Collections Storage." ABHS proposed to improve and increase collections storage in our archival vaults by purchasing and installing additional storage systems.

We are revising our application in response to reviewers' comments for submission in the next grant cycle (January).

## Outreach

We continue outreach to congregations and regions by means of church anniversary certificates.

Another aspect of outreach is hosting visiting groups. A group from First Baptist Church of Albany, NY, visited in February as part of their Civil Rights Tour. In April we had two

groups visit: Northside Drive Baptist Church senior adult group and a group from Hopewell Missionary Baptist Church in Norcross, Georgia, who were taking a class in Baptist history. A group from Georgia Chin Baptist churches visited in May to see the exhibit on the Copes' missionary work. Members of the Board of International Ministries came for a tour of their archives in June. In August, we welcomed the Asian American Pastors Colloquium to ABHS.

We are working to make stronger connections in the wider Atlanta community. As in recent years, ABHS was a sponsor of the DeKalb County (GA) History Center's luncheon program in honor of Black History month. I attended a retirement banquet for Rev. Dr. Douglas Stowers of Mount Calvary Baptist Church, Atlanta in April, and a presentation by the Atlanta City Council honoring former Associate General Secretary Al Brinson in May.

#### Administration

Kay Eland has retired after 25 years of service to ABHS. For many years Kay took care of recording donations and making sure bills got paid. In that role, she got to know many ABHS supporters and represented ABHS well. We decided to consolidate staff by moving the Financial Secretary position from King of Prussia to Atlanta. During the transition period, Executive Director Priscilla Eppinger took on bookkeeping responsibilities.

The job posting for the Financial Clerk position yielded several qualified applicants. After careful screening and interviews, we hired Gusmar Chavarría as Financial Clerk. G Chavarría began work with ABHS on September 3, 2024.

## **Ministry Report**

## **Sabbatical Support**

We're thrilled to announce that a Palmer Grant has just been awarded for our partnership with New Hope Baptist Church in Denver, CO (Pastor Rev. Dr. Eugene Downing). Together, we have crafted a 2025 initiative to encourage and assist in planning context-appropriate sabbaticals and concrete shifts for "sabbath-minded" ministries. Downing and New Hope will be project leaders. This summer, we held an MC Live webinar on the topic: "God's Invitation: Sabbaticals and Sabbath-Minded Ministries"

## **Well-Being Hub**

Results from a Spring survey told us what we already expected: the pandemic has created a lasting level of burnout, exhaustion, and compassion fatigue amongst our clergy. In an effort to help ministers find the help we need, we are releasing a resource we are calling a "Hub for Clergy Well-Being." Accessed through our website, the Hub will provide assessment tools, as well as a multitude of resources for those seeking well-being in their mental/emotional, physical, financial, or vocational lives (as well as several other dynamics.) We are inviting members to access the Hub as a way to improve their own well-being and/or to become aware of resources for their colleagues in ministry.

## **Affinity Groups**

In our Leadership Team retreats in both 2023 and 2024, we have begun to imagine a new model for collegiality. We are grateful for the models of gathering that we currently use—namely, the large gathering of the Chapter and the small-group collegiality of Together in Ministry groups. But we know that these might yet leave some people out. We are imagining together how we might create and support groups based on *affinity*—retired clergy, clergy couples, single clergypersons, those within the first few years of ministry, or a myriad of other possibilities. We don't want to lessen support for the other two models, but the team has begun to envision new opportunities.

## **Covenant and Code of Ethics**

We continue to encourage the use of the revised version of the Covenant and Code of Ethics, released on February 1, 2023. Jacki Belile and her team are working on a companion Learning Guide to be used in parallel with the document.

## **National Gatherings**

By the time that BGM meets in November, we will have completed our Fall Retreat and Biennial Meeting, held at the Tuscarora Inn and Conference Center in Mt. Bethel, PA. Our speaker was teacher, preacher, and activist Kym McNair, who led us on the theme "A New Thing." Meanwhile, we are preparing to host an event at the 2025 Biennial Mission Summit and are looking forward to returning to gathering with siblings in Christ in Omaha. Of course, we continue to gather virtually every month for our MC Live webinars. Recent topics have been "Self Care, Spirituality, and God's Presence" and "How to Lead through Election Anxiety."



## **Transitions**

At our Fall Biennial meeting (and presuming a positive vote), I will pass the gavel to Rev. Rebecca Driscoll, who will resume duties as President on Jan 1, 2025. The terms of several long-term leadership team members will end with me, and I count myself blessed to be able to serve alongside of such an amazing team these last two years!

### **AMERICAN BAPTIST MEN USA LAYMEN'S MINISTRY REPORT 2024**

As we move toward that time that we will gather for the 2025 ABC USA Biennial, we are completing our transition from William "Bill" Morningstar administration to the new administration of Vernon A. Clement. We do have much to report and many blessings to thankful for as God continues to find a great purpose in the volunteer ministry and mission of M.E.N. (Mentoring, Evangelism, Nurturing). ABMen's Disaster Ministry was very busy in 2024.

Our year began with a Servant-Leadership Weekend in Richmond, VA at the Second Baptist Church – West End. The new president was installed during this weekend on Sunday, February 18, 2024. Our new president, Vernon A. Clement, attend the 2024 National Leadership Conference in Orlando, FL. At this gathering of ABC-USA national leaders, the needs, current conditions, along with their regional activities were discussed in various meetings. Time was, also, spent working on special policies and organizational issues. Mr. Clement took time to re-introduce ABMen-USA and connect with the regional executive ministries in attendance.

The ABMen USA Executive Committee met via Zoom for Disaster Leadership Training on May 22, 2024. We are looking for ways to get more active with national disaster volunteer agencies while maintaining our strong partnership with ABHMS disaster ministries. We were able to utilize both of our shower trailers during relief efforts for Hurricanes Helene and Milton. ABMen's Disaster Ministries sponsored several mission trips in 2024 to Kentucky, SW Virginia, West Virginia, North Carolina, and Florida. We are planning for continue mission trips to North Carolina and Florida especially with back-to-back hurricanes hitting almost identical paths. This provided good exposure for ABMen and spark interest from areas needing the services provided. (Showers, Laundry, and Feeding) We are actively seeking funding sources for our shower trailers as maintenance and deployment costs have risen tremendously. April through August was busy while various members of the Executive Committee participated in men's retreats, workshops and events nationwide (ABC of the Dakota's Region, Big Sky Region, West Virginia Baptist Convention, American Baptist Churches of the South [ABCOTS] Region).

In June, ABMen National President, Vernon A. Clement, represented ABMen USA by being the guest speaker at Antioch Baptist Church in Shreveport, LA Father's Day Service. Reverend Dr. Bruce C. Carroll is the senior pastor.

In August, Immediate Past President, William 'Bill' Morningstar, was the guest speaker at the ABMen- WV 100th celebration on August 3, 2024.

In October, ABMen Disaster Relief Coordinator, Jack Cobb representing ABMen USA along with ABMen of West Virginia traveled to Bakerville; Green Mountain; Lenoir; Spruce Pine; and Hendersonville, North Carolina following flooding from Hurricane Helene. The men presented these communities with much

needed emergency relief through an immediate “call” of need. The communities were very appreciative of ABMen USA’s continuing efforts of support. We were contacted specifically by a few areas that had families needing emergency assistance in repairing homes, replacing roofs, or clearing large debris from roadways so they could get back their homes for assessment. ABMen National President, Vernon A. Clement, was invited to lead ABCOTS Area III Men’s Auxiliary Meeting at Friendship Baptist Church. The small group was very attentive and energetic with excellent suggestions for them to start reaching male youths and the next generation of ABMen both now and in the future.

ABMen-USA is also happy to report that we reclaim the men of Puerto Rico back. As we had Pastor Wilfredo Mercado, president of ABMen in Puerto Rico and Reverend Dr. Edgardo Caraballo, Executive Minister for Puerto Rico to join our national board meeting in May. Dr. Caraballo and President Clement first met at the 2024 National Leadership Conference in Orlando, Florida.

ABMen USA continues to encourage volunteers to support mission opportunities at the Crow Indian Baptist Church and the Murrow Indian Children Home. These two mission projects have been long-term opportunities for our national men’s ministry in partnership with American Baptist Home Mission Society.

## **Report to the Board of General Ministries from the Special Director to International Ministries – November 2024**

The Board of International Ministries (IM) of the American Baptist Churches USA (ABCUSA) met June 21-22, 2024, in Atlanta, Ga. and September 13-14, 2024, in King of Prussia, Pa.

### **June 2024 meetings:**

In June, for 2 days prior to our meeting dates, we had the opportunity to visit the American Baptist Historical Society in Atlanta, Ga. and the Legacy Museum in Montgomery, Al.

On the first day we had a deep dive to our roots where our mission Movement started in 1814. Interestingly, this movement faced opposition even from church members opposed to supporting missionaries taking resources from local churches to support missions. Celebrating IM's 210<sup>th</sup> anniversary this year constitutes a testimony that God will always continue to lead the Great Commission even when obstacles come within the family.

On the second day prior to the meetings, we visited The Legacy Museum, The National Memorial for Peace and Justice, and The Freedom Monument Sculpture Park. Those visits were a hard, deep and sad look to a past where black people and other people of color suffered death and persecution that stemmed from a flawed "righteous vision" of oppression toward them and a shameful understanding that people are not equal simply because of the color of their skin. Did you know that an estimated 2 million enslaved people died in the Atlantic Ocean while sailing from Africa to the Americas? It was painful and hurtful remembering the Black Americans who were enslaved, terrorized by lynching, humiliated by racial segregation, and presumed guilty and dangerous. The day was tough emotionally but provided an education for all the IM Board to past historical events in the South.

On the first day of the meeting devotions were led by Board director and chair of the Equity and Justice Committee, Dezo Schreiner who challenged us to do the hard work in contrast to the hard work done by the African Americans. On the second day, we were honored participating at devotions led by global servants Amanda and Jon Good with a reflection based on Romans 1 and the relevance of "not [be] ashamed of the gospel, because it is the power of God that brings salvation to everyone who believes: first to the Jew, then to the Gentile." Romans 1:16.

The IM Treasurer's report summary:

IM's current operating budget performance for FY 2023-2024 remains strong with the projection of ending the fiscal year (FY) in a balanced position. The three primary revenue drivers – unrestricted general gifts, PSG income and World Mission Support, appear to be on track to come close to FY year end goals, in large measure due to the work of our Donor Advisors. Potential shortfall in revenue should be more than offset by expenditure less than budgeted.

World Relief Committee Board Report:

June, July and August are the months in which the World Relief Committee receives the donations through the One Great Hour of Sharing offering. In September, the Committee will meet to review money received and set a budget. At least \$100K is kept in reserve for emergency needs. In November, they meet again to consider requests and determine disbursements. Development requests for funds come largely through International Ministries Area Directors who present projects submitted by IM Global Servants (our missionaries). Typically, only the top request from each Area Director is granted due to limited funding (currently, there are 5 - IM Area Directors). In addition, monies are also designated directly for emergency relief for responses to war, fire, flooding, earthquakes and other disasters.

This Board meeting approved the following motions:

1. IM Endowment Initiative for the 4th Quarter of Fiscal Year 2024 to provide additional funding for the purpose of maximizing IM's ability to secure endowed gifts to IM.
2. IM Board Resolution on the Retainer Rate for Undesignated Bequests and Estate Gifts to Promote the Sustainable and Responsible Growth of the IM Endowment.
3. Approve contracting Perception Strategies LLC and the required funding required to work as a consulting firm for the implementation of the IM Board Resolution on Racial Justice.

### **September 2024 IM meetings:**

Global Servant Barbara Bolick led us in a devotion about her work using Mark 5:22-42. Barb manages and directs the Talita Cumi Girls' Clubs (TCGC) in Costa Rica focusing her ministry on girls' discipleship and education. She spoke about how her work has changed a dangerous area into a community who trusts and cares about the work she does with girls. TCGC, along with partners in Latin America, provide mentor training, materials, and ongoing support.

The IM All Staff Gathering celebration was held in Denver, CO. on July 8-12, 2024. This event happens every 10 years. The IM staff, Global Servants and a handful of Board directors were gathered at Crossroads Church in Denver, CO. The focus of the gathering was on unity and community, and both were improved upon. The event came in \$80k under budget because of two things: 1) The generosity of many donors who helped make the event possible; and 2) The decision-making on the part of IM staff and the Crossroads' hosts to cut costs and offer various parts of the event up for sponsorship. For example, the ABCRM region hosted the ice cream social evening. It was a joyful time to worship together and see firsthand the Global Servants discussing, from their own perspective, their experiences and vision of the past, present, and future of IM.

IM staff will be reading over the gathered input over the next few months and will be trusting that God's continued guidance for the future steps for IM will emerge from the community's discernment.

The role of the OGHS offering and its significance to the work of International Ministries was discussed. Concern was expressed over possible changes to the historical reason (world relief) for this annual offering.

FY 2024-2025 Budget:

A balanced budget for FY 2024-2025 is being reviewed by the IM Finance committee. To balance the budget, draws on IM assets of \$488,750, in addition to the 4% draw on the average market value of IM' "endowment" over the trailing 60 months, will be required.

It is an honor and privilege to serve as the BGM representative to the IM Board.

Together, as a ministry, we have overcome much, and I believe we are emerging stronger than ever before. Let us continue to draw courage from our faith, just as my mother did, as we press forward—bold, strong, and united in our mission.

I'm pleased to submit the report of the Kachin American Baptist Association.

1. We thrill to participate at the Burma Advocacy Group and contributed \$5,000 to BAG.
2. KABA Women Ministry hosted the "Women Conference" in Great Salt Lake, Utah, on July 4-7, 2024. 150 women from our member churches joined together.
3. KABA supervised one Bible Institute called Ola Hanson Bible Institute (OHBI). It is affiliated with Central Baptist Theological Seminary (CBTS) since 2021. The CBTS conferred the certificate of ministry study level I & II and the Diploma in Kachin Christian Formation Degree for our Bible Institute. Sixty-eight students have recently enrolled in the third batch of the Certificate of Ministry Studies Program Level I, and 28 students have enrolled in the first batch of the Diploma Program. The third batch of the Certificate program level II and the second batch of the diploma program started in August 2024. There are 58 students enrolled in the Certificate of Ministry Studies Program Level II, and 32 students enrolled in the Second Batch of Diploma Program.
4. Minister Committee arranged the pulpit exchange program through the churches.
5. As an Executive Minister of KABA, I attended the Mini Mission Workshop led by the Mission Department of International Myanmar Baptist Fellowship held at Gordon Conwell Theological Seminary, Boston, Massachusetts on August 23, 2024.
6. KABA will hold its 5<sup>th</sup> Biennial General Assembly and 7<sup>th</sup> Youth Camp at Camp Copass in Denton, Texas, on December 27-30, 2024. We also will celebrate our association's tenth anniversary during this assembly. Dr. Roy Medley will be the keynote speaker of the Biennial General Assembly and the tenth-anniversary celebration service.
